"History" generally may be considered to range from "wie es eigentlich gewesen," to "just one damn thing after another," to the development of metaphysical conceptions such as Reason, Liberty, Progress, Objectivity, the dialectical development of paradigms, etc.

We do not opt for any particular pattern of historical writing but stress only that the historian is to be conscious not only of his own methods of writing but is to be clear about his use of historical explanation and evidence,

All histories are themselves part of the history of the particular period in which they are written. Rather than inferring from this predicament a flabby historical relativism and easy susceptibility to ideologies, we stress the persistent struggle for scholarly excellence.
